#### **Course Overview:**

 Examines the police role and law enforcement policy, police organization, personnel issues, management, and operations, as well as coordination and consolidation of police service, police integrity, and community relations.

#### **Course Learning Goals:**

- Develop an understanding of history of policing and the use of innovations, programs, and technology to address challenge areas in policing.
- Develop critical thinking and assessment of issues related to policing.
- Develop written and verbal communication skills.

#### **Course Learning Objectives:**

• The course objective is to gain an overall understanding of the policies and practices of criminal justice agencies and how they may directly or indirectly affect other criminal justice agencies, social systems, and/or key stakeholders without solely referencing personal experiences and/or long held beliefs.

#### **Required Readings:**

• Assigned materials will be made available in Canvas. There is no required textbook.

## **Course Requirements:**

• This course will be administered in persona in a traditional face-to-face format and will have a Canvas page to provide course materials such as supplementary readings, video links, discussion board activities, and lecture slides. To be successful in this course, it is recommended that you have consistent access to a laptop/desktop and stable internet. Students are expected to consume assigned articles and related media and be familiar with materials assigned.

• Late Work Policy – Students are expected to submit work on or before the due dates listed on this course syllabus, Canvas, and provided in weekly announcements and class reminders. If a student fails to submit an assignment (e.g., discussion board, research paper) by the due date stated they will receive a 0. The student may email the instructor a copy of the assignment for requested grading. The student will lose 10 points per 24-hour period after the stated due date. For example, if an assignment was due 9/1/2022@5:00pm and the students submitted the assignment on 9/3/2022@5:00pm they would face a 20-point late penalty. Please note late submissions are not allowed on all assignments/exams (see syllabus/Canvas).

#### **Course Evaluations:**

<u>Class Participation/Attendance/Group Activities 20%:</u> Students are expected to attend all scheduled classes and activity engage in class discussions (e.g., responding to questions). Students will be assigned into workgroups for the semester. <u>Research Paper 30%:</u> Students will write a research paper on a topic of their choosing. The paper will be 12 to 15 written pages, including a title, abstract, and reference page in APA Format (please note the title, abstract, and reference page in APA format do not count towards the 12 to 15 pages of the paper). See Canvas for more detail and grading rubric.

 Al and related technologies may not be used to generate or create your research paper. If Al and related technologies are identified, you will receive a 0 for the research paper.

<u>Research Paper Presentation 30%:</u> Each student will present a brief 10–15-minute presentation of their Research Paper using PowerPoint or Google Slides etc. See Canvas for more detail and grading rubric. \*\*\*Note if a student misses their Research Paper Presentation date, they may request to present the following date, however dates availability is not guaranteed\*\*\*

 Al and related technologies may not be used to generate or create your research paper presentation. If Al and related technologies are identified, you will receive a 0 for the research paper presentation.

Exams 20%: There are 2 exams each worth 10% each (for a total of 20%) of your final grade

- This will be 2 exams that will consist of a series of 4 essay questions worth
   25 points each.
- o Each response should be between 750 and 1000 words.
- Al and related technologies may not be used to generate or create responses. If Al and related technologies are identified, you will receive a 0 for the exam.
