## **Course Information**

#### **Rutgers Course Catalog Description**

This course relates urban design and management to crime and crime reduction. The course is presented through the critical lens of problem-oriented policing and situational crime prevention to reduce local crime. It emphasizes evidence-based decision-making, community engagement, efficient utilization of resources, transparency, and sustainability. This course provides a practical study of policies and programs that demonstrate how police and other organizations can address crime vulnerabilities and exposures in the communities they serve through strategies that go beyond specific deterrence of offenders. This course may count towards an MA certificate, Spatial Analysis for Public Safety and Security.

#### **Course Overview**

This course gives graduate students an overview of key institutions, processes, and policies regarding place-based community crime prevention. Using various materials and approaches, students will be introduced to urban design and crime management research, policing strategies, problem-oriented policing and community engagement, situational crime prevention, and evidence-based decision-making in crime reduction.

## Learning Objectives (LOs)

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

LO 1. Understand and critically assess the research on problem-oriented policing, situational crime prevention, risk-based policing, and place-based community crime prevention.

LO 2. Explore essential research questions in crime management and reduction using policing strategies in local communities.

LO 3. Understand the broad range of policies and practices on urban design, risk terrain modeling, spatial analysis, and crime reduction.

LO 4. Sharpen analytical and writing skills by completing course readings, informed discussions, various assignments, and a research paper.

In learning about crime and justice, students may encounter language, depictions, behaviors, and/or attitudes that they may find disturbing or offensive. In this course, we will use person-centered language (https://rscj.newark.rutgers.edu/wpcontent/uploads/2023/11/SCJ-1st-person-humanizing-language-statement.pdf), not labels based on statuses or behaviors (e.g., inmates, offenders, parolees, etc.) when talking about the people's involvement in crime and the criminal legal system. The Rutgers University School of Criminal Justice (SCJ) encourages students, faculty, and staff to use person-first and humanizing language in their verbal and written communications. Being mindful of how we describe people impacted by our criminal legal systems is essential in restoring their dignity and humanity. This evolution of language is a crucial piece of broader systemic shifts needed to make our justice systems more equitable. We encourage replacing labels that refer to people as "offender," "inmate," "parolee," or related terms with more neutral descriptors such as "person convicted of a crime," "incarcerated person," and "person under parole supervision."

## **Final Grades**

## **Course Assessment**

Weekly Assignments (60 points): Students will submit assignments based on the readings. This paper should be no more than 2-3 pages, double-spaced, Times New Roman font. Due dates for all assignments are on Canvas.

**Weekly Discussion Board (60 points):** You must complete a weekly discussion session. Your weekly discussion post should be based on factual information from the readings and not personal opinions. All discussions should be objective and factual, not subjective.

- In a discussion board forum, you must write a 200 minimum-word response to the questions/situation/paper given. You are then to read other students' posts and choose ONE post to provide feedback on.
- Posting early in the week or by Wednesday or Thursday gets the momentum going and allows other classmates to respond to your post. Your main post and response to another classmate's post must be completed weekly by Sunday at 11:59 pm.
- Your feedback to another classmate's posting should be at least 50 words.
- Discussions are graded weekly. Therefore, no post means zero points. Points will be lost for all late and incomplete discussion posts.

Discussions should be written in essay format, not bullet points, as you discuss a topic, not a summary of information. Think of discussions as short essays with ideas that flow in complete sentences.

**Final exam (60 points):** Students will complete a final exam related to topics covered in class. More information about the final paper is available on Canvas. The final exam questions will be given one week before its due date. Students will answer several questions based on information covered during the semester. Additional instructions for the final exam will be provided when the exam is released.
