Course Description

This course examines the rapidly evolving role of technology and artificial intelligence (AI) in public policy and in the criminal legal system. Recent years have seen a dramatic rise in the use of big data and algorithmic approaches to sentencing, recidivism risk assessments, predictive policing, facial recognition investigations, and forensics. These shifts have fundamentally changed the dynamics of the criminal justice system, creating both new opportunities and new causes for concern.

This course will introduce the legal processes implicated by AI, describe the constitutional criminal procedure rules are at stake, and deepen your understanding of how these technologies work and are evolving. We will learn the fundamentals of how these new technologies work and analyze their development, implementation, and effects through a social science lens.

Course Goals

- Stimulate your thinking about how AI interacts with public policy and is used within the criminal legal system
- Understand the rules of evidence and criminal procedure rights affected by Al
- Engage with recent court cases and policy debates concerning the use of AI in the criminal legal system
- Develop skills in deliberating with others about pressing law and technology problems
- Develop original arguments and analysis of challenges raised by using Al

Prerequisites

There are no prerequisites, but a course in criminal justice or criminal procedure would be helpful.

COURSE ELEMENTS

Participation & Attendance

You will receive one point toward your final grade for attending each weekly course meeting and submitting a brief written response to a question posed on Canvas **prior to class** for 14 total grade points.

Additionally, you will be assigned two class periods where you will be expected to lead a discussion with me and your classmates about the class material. On your designated days, I will ask you to brief our materials by preparing a 2 page summary of the readings and two discussion questions per reading. In class, be prepared to raise these questions and actively respond to others. Each of these participation days is worth 18 grade points, so it is critical to come well prepared.

Please **email this document to me by Wednesday at 4:00 pm, prior to your assigned class.** If you cannot attend class, still submit your discussion notes by the due date for half credit for the weekly attendance point.

Final Paper

You have three options for your final paper, which is worth 50 points and is due <u>December 13</u>. For each scenario, you will analyze one application of AI in the criminal legal context.

A brief summary of your planned paper topic is due via email by November 7.

Option 1: Persuasive legal brief

You will prepare an 8–10-page persuasive brief calling for the inclusion or the exclusion of a particular technology within a specific sector of the criminal legal system. Your aim here is to persuade a judge who is tasked with determining the constitutionality of this tool, as well as considerations of unintended consequences and/or public benefits.

Option 2: Expert report

For this assignment, you will submit an objective social science-driven expert report of 8-10 pages that critically assesses the state of research regarding a particular technological tool as used in a specific criminal legal system application. Your goal here is to inform the court or legislature about the current state of knowledge regarding this tool.

Option 3: Social history

This assignment asks you to develop a social history of an AI tool in an 8–10-page paper, drawing upon multidisciplinary sources and engaging theoretically with the literature on science, technology, and history.
